Omaha, Nebraska (October 2, 2009) — This month, Film Streams' Ruth Sokolof Theater continues its **Forever Young** family and children's series with seven beloved classics — spanning more than 50 years of cinema -- showing through the end of the year.

The series, which began in July 2009, presents wonderful opportunities for younger audiences to experience children's classics in all of their big-screen splendor and for older kids (moms, dads, sisters, brothers, aunts, uncles, grandparents, and everyone in between) to reconnect with some of the most artistic and imaginative children's movies ever made.

Upcoming films include: **Dr. Seuss' The 5,000 Fingers of Dr. T.** (1953); **Wallace & Gromit in The Curse of the Were Rabbit** (2005); **Annie** (1982); **The Black Stallion** (1979); **The New Adventures of Pippi Longstocking** (1988); **Looney Tunes: Bugs Bunny & Friends**; and **The Muppet Christmas Carol** (1992).

All films within the Forever Young series show on Thursdays, Saturdays and Sundays. More information on the films, including dates, can be found on the following pages.

The 5,000 Fingers of Dr. T 1953

Directed by Roy Royland.

With a story, screenplay, and lyrics by the one-and-only Dr. Seuss, the musical fantasy THE 5,000 FINGERS OF DR. T—about a boy who drifts to sleep and dreams up an elaborate fairy tale involving his sinister piano teachers, Dr. Terwilliker—is as original as they come. USA; 89 min.

October 24 – 25, 29, 31, November 1, 5

Wallace & Gromit in The Curse of the Were-Rabbit 2005

Directed by Steve Box & Nick Park.

An Academy Award-winner and instant stop-motion classic, WALLACE & GROMIT features the inventor and his intelligent dog as pest-control inspectors (“Anti-Pesto”) challenged by a vegetable-devouring mutant bunny of their own creation. Featuring voice work by Helena Bonham Carter and Ralph Fiennes. UK; 85 min.

November 7 – 8, 12, 14 – 15, 19

Annie 1982

Directed by John Huston.

An adaptation of the Broadway show and one of the most beloved movie musicals of all time, ANNIE follows the adventures of its ebullient title character, from the dreary orphanage run by the bullying Miss Hannigan (Carol Burnett) to her new life with Oliver “Daddy” Warbucks (Albert Finney). USA; 127 min.

November 21 – 22, 26, 28 – 29, December 3

The Black Stallion 1979

Directed by Carroll Ballard.

Among the most beautiful motion pictures of all time, THE BLACK STALLION brings the classic children’s novel—about a boy shipwrecked on a desert island with a wild stallion, and the friendship that forms before and after their rescue—to the big screen. USA; 118 min.

December 5 – 6, 10, 12 – 13, 17

The New Adventures of Pippi Longstocking 1988

Directed by Ken Annakin.

Precocious and pig-tailed Pippi casts her mischievous charm on just about everyone she meets—save a nonplussed social worker named Miss Bannister—in this delightful remake of the 1969 Swedish original. USA; 102 min.

The Muppet Christmas Carol 1992

A retelling of the Dickens holiday classic featuring Kermit the Frog as Bob Cratchit, Miss Piggy as Emily Cratchit, Fozzie Bear as Fezziwig (“Fozziwig”), Michael Caine as Ebenezer Scrooge, and narration by Gonzo. USA; 89 min.
